PROF ADAI CALLS FOR MORAL, ETHICAL IMPROVEMENT

The need to improve the Moral and Ethical well being of staff, and students with a view to achieving the University's vision/mission, has been emphasized.

The emphasis was made at a Public Lecture presented by a Professor of Educational Leadership and Human Services, Prof. Adai Sooliman Ibrahim with the theme: **"Strategic Survey Research on Quality Programmes and Students' Success: Dealing with the Moral and Ethical Dimensions on Instructional and Institutional Effectiveness"** on Thursday, November 10, 2016 at the Caverton Lecture Theatre, Main Campus.

Prof. Adai who is also the pioneer Director, Quality Assurance and Productivity (QAP) Unit, Federal University of Technology, Minna pointed out the various moral challenges in educational systems and the flaws on the part of the lecturers as well as students.

He described the lecture as an avenue for self assessment and not a ground for criticism.

The Quality Assurance and Productivity Unit, according to him, aims at overseeing the general learning condition, performance and moral disposition of the University community, while strongly encouraging research among academic staff of the University, which is a very significant aspect of academic pursuits.

In the course of his lecture, he skillfully explained that the Unit in the last five years, among other activities, has been able to plan and conduct several workshops for both academic and non-academic staff aimed at improving the social and academic well being of students.

More so, for the University Management to effectively implement and evaluate the impact of its strategic efforts on programmes and services. The Unit has collected and reviewed activities and services of the various stakeholders in order to have a realistic in sight into their activities, he explained.

Prof. Adai further stated that from the Unit findings, FUT, Minna has many well qualified staff from reputable institutions, best campus facilities, evidence of national representation (staff and students), best medical facilities and an open door policy.

He posited that the University Management must establish and implement policies that will equip staff and students with adequate intellectual tools for efficient service delivery, otherwise all efforts made toward becoming great institution would have been fruitless.

Speaking on the significance of the lecture the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Musbau Adewumi Akanji, *FNSBMB, FAS*, said the lecture was enlightening and calls for soul searching for all. He commended the Unit for the various surveys carried out to improve the system as part of the various activities that bring together the "town and gown." He also explained that such forum gives opportunity to clarify some grey areas within the system.

FG TAKING STEPS TO REVAMP AGRICULTURE —GOV. BELLO

Niger State Governor, Alhaji (Dr.) Abubakar Sani Bello has said the federal government is taking a bold step toward developing River Basin Development Authority in the country to bring back life

to agriculture as it is a known fact that oil can no longer sustain the country.

The Governor who was represented by the Honourable Commissioner for Agriculture and Rural Development, Alhaji Aliyu Abdullahi **oon** said this at the 44th Annual Conference of Weed Science Society of Nigeria, with the theme **"Agriculture – An Alternative to Oil Dependent Nigeria: The Role of Weed Management,"** held on Monday, November 7, 2016 at the School of Agriculture and Agricultural Technology, Gidan Kwano Campus.

Gov. Bello noted that the government of Niger State is already talking to a Chinese company, APP African Machinery Company on the possibility of supplying more than 300 tractors and other farm implements towards mechanizing agriculture. This development, he said, is to encourage our youths who are roaming the street looking for white collar job to embrace agriculture as a means of employment.

Speaking at the opening ceremony, the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Musbau Adewumi Akanji, **FNSBMB, FAS**, said that since oil can no longer sustain the country, for Nigeria to achieve its desired goal in food security, weed management in crop production must not and cannot be over looked.

He commended the society for the conference theme, saying it is most appropriate, coming at a time Nigeria is facing a down turn in economy and the government is returning to agriculture, which was the country's mainstay prior to discovery of oil in the 1960.

The National President of Weed Science Society of Nigeria, Prof. Friday Ekeleme in his speech urged all the members of the Society to take up leadership role toward sustainable weed management control in our cropping

system.

Prof. Ekeleme posited that farmers need to key into mechanical weed control system in small medium farming to enhance productivity and farmers income.

"We must develop Weed Management system that will eliminate the problem associated with Crop Production for poor famers by developing weed management module for different cropping system in Nigeria," he noted.

In his keynote address, Dr. Samuel Agboire, Executive Director, National Cereals Research Institute (NCRI), Badeggi who was represented by Dr. Aliu Umar, Director, Research Output Department spoke on the importance of food security as a means of ensuring adequate supply, quantity and saving of food for rainy days.

He observed that rural communities that provide food produce at a lower rate cannot because of poor roads, electricity and other constraints and that it is obvious that enhancing food production in rural areas will enhance food security.

He reiterated that Nigeria is blessed with all the natural resources it needs to ensure food security such as land, good climate, water and deep soil. According to him the major impediment to food security is weed, which limit agricultural productivity both in commercial and subsistence farming.

He further gave ways of controlling weed to include hand labour, chemical and mechanical weed control system.

EXAM OFFICERS, LEVEL ADVISERS GET TIPS FOR INSTITUTIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

Academic leaders in the institution have been charged to put in more effort in the discharge of their duties towards institutional effectiveness.

Prof. Adai Ibrahim, Director, Quality Assurance and

Productivity (QAP) Unit, gave this charge while presenting the topic **"Institutional Leadership Actions Towards Institutional Effectiveness,"** during a 3-day workshop organized by QAP for all Deans, Deputy Deans, HODs, Examination Officers and Level Advisers held between Monday 7th, and Wednesday, 9th November, 2016 at the Main and Bosso Campuses.

The Director said the ability to plan, guide and support student learning stands as the focal point of both instructional and institutional effectiveness.

He described leadership as a process of motivating, guiding, coaching and supporting others to get the job done.

According to him, academic and administrative accountability with respect to student learning outcome lies squarely on the Deans, HODs, Examination Officers and Level Advisers.

Leadership task in the University system, the Director said is enormous and academic leaders are in the position to transform the institution to meet global best practices, while noting cultural, linguistic, socio economic and learning diversity in the University community.

Characteristics of effective school leaders, he maintained, include having high expectations for the success of their students, focusing relentlessly on improving teaching and learning and having regard for the progress and personal development of every student, robust and rigorous self evaluation and data analysis with clear strategies for improvement on the way forward.

The don said the institutional effectiveness cycle must be imbibed. This, he pointed out, involves planning by identifying expected outcomes aligned with the departmental/programme primary functions and the

University's mission, assessment by conducting assessment activities/evaluating the data to determine the extent to which outcomes have been accomplished and improvement by developing and implementing specific strategies for programme enhancement.

Other checks and balances he suggested include, conducting continuous assessment twice in a semester, properly documented, project supervision, examinations based on topics well covered, consistency in delivering lectures and advising.

In his address, while declaring the workshop open, the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Musbau Adewumi Akanji, *FNSBMB, FAS*, said the aim of the workshop was to remind the academic leaders of their roles and for them to do their best in improving teaching and learning. He noted that the University is doing well and with all the relevant stakeholders putting in their best, the University will keep soaring higher.

He urged the Heads of Department to continue to be responsible to duty as they hold very vital positions in the departments.

The VC thanked the Unit for putting up the workshop, which is aimed at moving the University forward.

Prof. Akanji implored members of staff to always attend trainings and workshops, just as he advised them to take their health seriously by always informing the School Medical Team of any serious health challenges they have while promising that the University is ready to help in such situations.

Day 2 of the workshop it was held on Tuesday, November 8, 2016 at the Caverton Lecture Theatre, School of Agriculture and Agricultural Technology (SAAT). It was chaired by DVC (Academic) Prof. Oluwole Morenikeji who was represented by Prof. Asimiyu Junaid, Dean, School of Environmental Technology (SET). The training was a replica of Day 1, but was specifically for the examination officers and academic level advisers in Gidan Kwano Campus.


Prof. Junaid said the training was important because the Examination Officers and Academic Level Advisers were the ones that have direct contact with students and all members of the University community.
